Dear Assembly Members,

I am writing to encourage the Borough Assembly to approve the matching grant money that has been requested for the Kobe Farm Community Road Project.

I listened to the last assembly meeting regarding this matter. I was quite surprised to hear comments regarding "no oversight" and "no plan" available. I would suggest that the assembly specifically request that information from the borough clerk – this information is in borough records. The DeBlauw's have kept good records and submitted them to the borough as required.

I would like to point out while the road is still in rough shape it is in far better condition than when it was originally put in. When the road was originally constructed it was just plowed in, resulting in the road being lower than the surrounding ground. The objective of the entire project is to raise the level of the road and provide drainage, especially during breakup. Four culverts have been put in, grade checks have been completed on each culvert and the water runs, unimpeded, to the north. The road does still need to be raised more at the culverts to prevent water running over the road at breakup.

Mr. Chatfield expressed the possibility of pulling gravel up from the side of the road, rather than trucking in gravel. An area past culvert one, but before culvert two, was below ground level which resulted in a lake during break up. Gravel was pulled up from the side of the road in that area and brought in from the state gravel pit to build up 240' of road to an appropriate level. Culverts two and three were put in place and the road raised totally by pulling gravel from the side of the road. Culvert four (worked on in 2020) utilized gravel pulled from the side of the

road to raise the level of the road. In the area of culvert four the water ran to the road, down the road for about 200' before being able to escape off the road to the north. The culvert and ditching has corrected that problem. Culvert four requires more gravel to complete that job. The gravel required for that will be pulled from the side of the road.

Culvert one was put in with gravel from the state pit.

Work still needing to be done includes easing the transitions from Koby Rd. into the cell tower access and from Kobe Rd into Ranch Rd from culvert number one, and raising Kobe Rd in that area near the cell tower road to block water from running across the road.

We appreciated hearing Mr. Chatfield's positive comments regarding his perspective on the quality and improvements to Kobe Rd., as someone that uses the road regularly.

Many hours of volunteer work have been donated to this project. Considerable funds and use of personal equipment have been donated to this project. Record keeping has been kept and submitted to the borough by the DeBlauws.

We strongly urge the borough to approve the \$10,000 requested for work on the Kobe Farm Community road project.

Thank you, Mayor and Assembly Members, for all you do for Denali Borough.

We listened to the May 12, 2021 Borough Assembly Meeting. After hearing the discussion on the Kobe Road Project and the request for the assembly to reconsider giving the nonprofit Kobe Farm Community some level of funding, we address this item:

When an assembly member announced that he/she has been told (by who?) that there is a lot of discrepancy about the work and where the money is spent - we felt that it suggests we are mishandling borough money. We felt slandered. Please look at the year 2019 for the record of how the money was spent. Please look at 2020 for how the money was spent. Maybe in the future, comments concerning any issue should be required to be emailed with names attached so that each member of the assembly is included and not any one member of the assembly is signaled out to relay an opinion.

In 2019, our work and how the money was spent was under the oversight of the borough staff. In 2020, because of the pandemic, Kobe Farm Community received \$10,000.00, like all the other nonprofits. The direction was that reporting was not required but to be ready to explain how the money was spent. We are ready.

Kobe Road is being improved, even if people don't like it or want it. The truth is there will always be opposition. Kobe Farm Community went into this project the summer of 2019 after the assembly gave unanimous support at the special meeting of June 6, saying the borough could get behind us in improving Kobe Road. We appreciate the members of Kobe Farm Community and other neighbors in Kobe Ag who are supportive of the improvements. Improving this road is a service to many - the people who live in the Ag, to visitors, to hunters, to first responders. Our area is a part of the Denali Borough and it has a great need - decent roads. We need the support of the borough.

Personal Stuff - at a meeting of the neighbors at our house in 2018 to discuss maybe improving the road, we were met with opposition then and warned about Hill Billy Justice. Since then we have been victims of Hill Billy Justice: 1) Rupert Smith's dozer had sugar put in the fuel tank, 2) after the Easter weekend, our car was parked out on the parking lot and the radiator was damaged when a crowbar was rammed through it-\$2200 repairs. 3) we put up a bulletin board in the parking lot, which was suggested by the borough staff to be used to post where we would be working on the road and when, so everyone was aware of the schedule, and the bulletin board was tore off leaving only one piece, 4) our dog, Fritz, was poisoned and died October 24, 2020. We have contacted the trooper about our car.

Come and see the improvements on Kobe Road, talk with us about what is being worked on. We are committed to this project - even with the negativity - but there is a lot of positive, too.

RE: Kobe Road Improvement

Again, thank you for the discussion at the last assembly meeting of May 12, 2021 concerning the input on the Kobe Road Improvement Project.

Kobe Farm Community wants to move forward on this project and whatever funds the borough would grant is going to help. The construction season of 2019 and 2020 involved moving dirt, ditching, installing culverts, putting gravel on the road. It was decided to work on areas of the road that had the biggest problems which meant moving to these areas instead of starting at the beginning working lock-step west.

This construction season of 2021, this kind of improvement would continue with building up the culverts, raising the road, ditching, and excavating gravel from the ditches. As was stated in our email to the May Assembly meeting, the church camp - Camp Challenge- is starting a large project. They have rented two excavators, a D6 cat, dump truck, and crews of volunteers who are dirt builders. Sharing the cost of mobilization and rental time would be a great advantage.

Although we do not know if we will receive borough grant funds... we can still give a summary of what we would like to accomplish. We talked with George Haskins of Great American Mining, who KFC contracted last season to do the road construction, (and a side note to say that George and his brother Laren must have 80 years experience doing dirt construction between them) about what the members of KFC want to see improved.

With operators and equipment rented, we won't be using the Great American Mining Company's equipment. Mr. Haskins has agreed to help on a consulting basis. We have a very high degree of confidence in George Haskins. He and Laren have put heart and soul in this project. Before we lift a shovel of dirt, there will be a meeting with all involved, including Camp Challenge's Job Superintendent.

What follows is our tentative plan: Work will be performed starting from the West at the 4th culvert . Approaches to the culvert will be brought up. Going East to the Medley's driveway area, the road needs to be brought up one foot to fill a 200 foot stretch of road that already has a solid base. It will take approximately 200 yards to fill it up.

Going East to culvert #3, the approaches need to be brought up 18" which requires approximately 150 yds.

Going East from Amber Street, to number 2 culvert, the gravel is on the surface or very close to the surface. It will be put on the top of the road. The right of way has been cleared in 2019. Now an excavator can extract the gravel from side of the road, dump it on the road and a ditch is formed from the excavation.

On #2 culvert, the approaches need to be raised, and there are two deep holes on the east side of the culvert that need to be filled.

Thank you for reading this and for reconsidering our request. Any amount will move the project forward. We know that the above job description is above and beyond what funds may be granted, but now you see the scope.

**Superintendent's Report

Dear Denali Borough Assembly and Mayor Walker,

1. Appreciation/Congratulations

- a. Congratulations to all of our graduates from DBSD. Anderson celebrated one graduate, Tri-Valley honored twelve, and PEAK recognized 72 (a record). Cantwell took a pause this year and looks forward to holding a graduation ceremony next year.
- b. Thank you to everyone who participated in and watched our Celebrations of Learning in May at Cantwell, Tri-Valley and Anderson. I was impressed by the high-quality work our students shared and in their responses to audience questions. The students communicated how they grew as learners and as people through their academic work and support they received. Great job everyone.

2. 2021 Smart Start -

- a. CDC School Guideline Update - On Thursday the 13th, the CDC updated its guidance and masks and face coverings. For fully vaccinated individuals masks need not be worn indoors in most situations. They are still required during transportation services such as airplanes. In the days following this general announcement the CDC clarified that it had not changed its guidance for schools and still recommends universal wearing of masks in schools. The District will continue to our current practice of wearing face covering through the end of this school year and into the summer. Toward the end of summer, we will complete a full review of our mitigation strategies, the CDC/DHSS guidance in place at that time, and the local and state-wide case prevalence, and update our strategies. It is our fervent hope that this will allow all or some of our classes to operate with fewer and less disruptive mitigation measures. A combination of a high vaccination rate, low case numbers and broad strategies such as screening testing may allow many of our students to safely attend school without the need to wear face coverings.
- b. Screening Testing - Reena and I are working on the paperwork of this grant. It will provide funds specifically to support school-based screening tests. Nurse Keith completed our CLIA waiver and we received our first

shipment of supplies. This includes hundreds of antigen test kits, and a rapid molecular test, the Cue.

- c. ARPA and ESSER III Funding - Reena and I are working on the initial paperwork for this grant award. We received final confirmation of the amount at \$216,579. This is below the amount in our FY22/FY23 fiscal plan which was \$310,000, and far below the initial estimate of ~\$500,000. I was able to summarize the mitigation practices of the District in a document to support receipt of this award. As part of the planning and needed regular review of the plans (mitigation and financial) we generated and shared a simple survey and published that to our families. 3. Finances

- a. FY21 Budget - Reena and I are finalizing the amount to ask the Board to transfer from the operating fund to the transportation fund. This was discussed at the recent board meeting and is necessary in order to follow our financial plans for this year and the statutes regarding payment for home-to-school transportation.

4. Facilities

- a. Anderson Roof Project - We learned of further issues with the Anderson Roof. We were able to inspect the roof once all the snow melted. A lot of seams between the tin section are pulling apart. A lot of construction debris was left on the roof prior to the installation of the EPDM coating. These nails and screen poke through this covering in many places as a result of the snow pressure on the roof. Curtis has been in communication with the engineers and construction company. The vice president of the construction company is coming down to view the damage personally. As this project is still in progress no items have been signed off as for substantial completion. Our formal warranty period begins upon the date of signing that document. Curtis met with company representatives on site this week. They are standing behind their commitment to fix the issues with the roof. Mobilization and work will begin in early June.
- b. Transportation RFP - We resolved the concerns with First Student and signed a contract with them for home-to-school transportation for the next five school years.
- c. Hydrolyzing Machine - Four partner entities have contact us for supplies or samples of this cleaning/sanitizing product. We continue to offer for free to local non-profits and at extremely low cost to commercial enterprises.
- d. Door Locks - Installation on the locks began and will be completed this summer.
- e. Coal Bin and Silo - We are emptying the coal bin and silo completely. This involves loosening the “fines” that have accumulated on the sides and feeding that into the boiler. This ensures that this material does not continue to build up nor hold excess moisture. The moisture causes issues

and prevents effective feeding of coal into the boiler. At times the burning of the fines leads to a darker smoke from the boiler so please remember this if you pass by the school and see this.

- f. Softball Field - We are still coordinating with TVVFD to do a controlled burn of the field to remove the deep thatch and improve user safety.
- g. Tri-Valley Generator - No update

5. Personnel

a. Certified Staff

- i. We continue to recruit a special education teacher for Tri-Valley. At this point I have reviewed over 75 general applications from Alaska Teacher Placement. Very few are direct applicants to DBSD. We have two interviews scheduled for next week.

June 2021 Mayor's Report to the Denali Borough Assembly

This report speaks primarily to non-agenda items. Agenda items will be discussed in meeting.

Alaska Tourism Restoration Act

- The borough appreciates the hard work of our Congressional Delegation in helping to pass the above-named act, which allows for a temporary “work around” of the law that requires foreign-flagged ships to visit a foreign (Canadian) port. The criteria, however, includes a round trip voyage - so Gulf crossings, the bread and butter of the Denali cruise industry, will not be sailing this year.

Visitation Outlook and Industry Issues

- Checking in with a cross section of Denali-area businesses, many operators of lodgings and activities are reporting strong bookings. Of the larger hotels, the Grande/Bluffs is reporting the highest occupancy levels, with a number of nights sold out.
- The borough worked with the National Park Service to best understand the local COVID-19 risk levels in order to make the most informed decisions regarding mitigation measures. We are pleased the Park Service increased the seating capacity on buses into the park, which offers additional capacity to visit the heart of the park.
- Many businesses are reporting difficulties finding employees and many are reducing offerings and/or hours of operation due to the labor shortage. Additionally, businesses are impacted by supply chain interruptions. For example, one activity provider reported they are limited in their growth potential because they cannot find a van for sale anywhere in Alaska.

Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) Update

- Borough staff continue weekly meetings with FEMA and the State of Alaska regarding our application for Public Assistance to reimburse the borough for COVID-19 response and testing program expenses. The outlook is positive for reimbursement of these eligible expenses.

State of Alaska Dept. of Health and Social Services (DHSS) Updates

- The State has “stood down” its Incident Command located at JBER and the functions of the IC have moved over to the DHSS Emergency Operations Center.
- The borough and the DHSS have signed a Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) for the provision of COVID testing and vaccination services going forward through March 2022. The expenses incurred within the Horizon Medical contract, who is providing testing and vaccination services this summer, will be reimbursed through this MOA.

June Vaccination Clinics

- Horizon is hosting vaccination clinics located at the Tri-Valley Community Center. The next scheduled clinics are on June 11 and June 17.
- Currently all three authorized vaccines (Pfizer, Moderna, and Johnson & Johnson) are being provided. Visit horizonmedicalak.com for more information and to make your appointment today.
- The borough's vaccination rate for those 12 and older stands at 62%, the highest in the Railbelt. By comparison, the rate for the Southeast Fairbanks Area (which includes Delta Junction and Tok) sits at 31%. I encourage all eligible to consider the many personal and public benefits of vaccination.

Legislative Update

- Not much has changed since last month's update. The current special session (number one of two scheduled) has born little fruit, with the Permanent Fund Dividend amount and an associated potential overdraw from the Earnings Reserve Account, serving as the main sticking point. We remain hopeful that a number of positive priorities (such as Community Assistance funding, Major School Maintenance funding, and federal ARPA relief funds allocations for trails funding and aid to revenue-impacted communities) will remain in the budget at the end of the day/month/fiscal year.
- The second special session, scheduled for August, will focus on Alaska's structural fiscal policy - including the PFD, potential new revenue in the form of a broad-based tax, the spending cap, questions of embedding components in the constitution, and requiring a vote of the people.

Staffing Update

- Our solid waste hire, to replace the outgoing seasonal landfill gatekeeper Kevin Walker, is Travis Olson, who formerly served the Denali Borough as a Lead Equipment Operator. Welcome back, Travis. The operational flexibility of hiring an operator into what was the gatekeeper position frees our Operations Manager Scott Wright to get more office work done and to attend to needs at the transfer stations.
- With our Treasurer Wendi Planty moving to Montana and Finance Clerk Connie MacMaster training to serve as the next Treasurer, Administrative Aide Sherry Shorey is training to move into the Finance Clerk role. We are pleased to have such capable and flexible staff who are stepping into new roles – especially in this year when financial management has grown in importance and complexity. The Administrative Aide job opening is posted and interviews will be conducted shortly.
